

Harbour Master's Comments

The weather for August improved during the last two weeks with very hot days and humid nights. We were saddened to hear of the death of John Collard, founder of the Rye Uers Committee (Which became, under statute, the Harbour of Rye Advisory Committee 1976) He wrote the Authoritative "Maritime History of Rye" which we all use when discussing present day issues. The memorial service is to be held at Rye church on Friday 6th September. The sailing vessel "Excelsior" is due to arrive at Rye on the same day. (H.W. 1120) The raft race has now taken place with some 12 entries starting at Scots Float Sluice and arriving at the Monkbretton Road Bridge, the finishing line. Councillor Peter Dyce attended on board the harbour launch to welcome in all contestants. New notice boards have been positioned around the harbour and local organisations are welcome to use them(see HM). We now have the updated version of the "Harbour Guide to Rye". These can be obtained from me at the harbour office. We had a visit by David Lawrence, the new Environment Agency's navigation manager based at head quarters, Bristol. We took the opportunity to acquaint him with the workings of the port and the many varied interests. Towards the middle of August a TV crew arrived from Northern France and spent a few days filming Rye and the surrounding area. The programme being produced is centred on the fishing industry and conservation. We were able to highlight the many positive features of Rye Harbour and the interesting characters that reside or work within. You may have noticed the pilots and boat crews training on Saturday 24th. We are required to exercise "Man over Board" at least twice a year. This involve ALL participants going into the water, swimming some 20 metres before being rescued by the on board retrieval system. We also fire test pyrotechnics and steer the boats using the emergency steering tillers. A new No 2 Red Light has been purchased for the tripod Beacon. The existing light is battery powered and has a limited range of visibility. The new light is solar powered with a life expectancy of eight year. The saving on batteries that cost £50 each (8 required) will be quite visible.

.......Departing Walvis Bay we travelled down the Ghost coast to Capetown, passing Dassen Island and the infamous Robin Island, A penal Colony, the enforced home for many year of Nelson Mandella, past President of South Africa. We arrived on a Glorious hot day with a thin layer of cloud covering the back ground mountain like a table cloth, hence the name "Table Mountain". We berthed in Duncan Docks where some 4,000 tons of general cargo, including horses, cattle, two dogs and a parrot, was discharged over the next 8 days. My first venture ashore was an experience. We had been told that black people (these included every nation other than western whites or Afrikaners, strangely enough, with the exception of the Japanese who had been re-classed "Honouree Whites"), were a different class to "Us", With separate shops, public transport, parks etc. Everywhere were signs "Nie Blanks" (non whites) or "White Only". The penalties for using non white facilities were very severe including beatings and imprisonment. We cadets, with little money, did use the side doors of shops and cafes to obtain food and curry that was very good. Following our night ashore at "Swankumand" the Chief Officer felt we needed more strenuous exercise to dispel our pent up energy so a "Walk" up Table Mountain was arranged. He paid for a taxi to delivery us at the base, a long way from the cable car, with strict instructions to climb to the top. Some four hours later and three thousand feet higher we had made it in the blistering heat. We descended by the cable car and even walked the four miles back to our ship. By now most of the outward cargo had been discharged and we were much higher in the water. We sailed from Capetown rounding the "Cape of Good Hope" experiencing huge swells that, with our decreased draft and small GM made us roll to alarming angles. Our next port was Port Elizabeth, the "Friendly City" Carl Baggwell (Harbour Master)





I thought I'd better contact you regarding putting the new goal posts on the Pound

I don't think this would be a good idea, at least not at the moment. While so far this summer there has not been so many incidents, I know of in the area, apart from a local 'family from hell' hunting rabbits using explosives (if you ever hear any of those really loud bangs, it's most likely they are at it again).

There is a continuing sporadic problem with some of the more daring kids exploring over the boundary bank next to gardens at the rear of Tram Rd. Various tools etc have gone missing. As yet there is no proper fencing on a lot of the gardens and extensions, some seem to have none at all. The Parish Council plan for the area, when it finally appears will hopefully include fencing or some way of keeping people on the 'right side' of this particular bank.

In the past there has been a lot of problems with stone throwing into back gardens, abuse (verbal) to residents and general 'noise nuisance'. There have been two cases of criminal damage I know of where the police have been involved, no arrests but a warning to one boy and a visit to his parents, as the age was 10 years! One victim was a neighbour who is house bound, her garden wall was partly destroyed. Anyway enough of these depressing details, the point is, that going by past records the Pound field is not secure. Not for some of the residents and probably not for any play equipment that's put there. When the Council plan appears, part of which I understand will include play equipment, and there has been the consultation of nearby homes etc, hopefully we will all be in agreement and know what to expect and where abouts in the field it will be. And with any luck some security measures like 'rules of use' signs to help avoid problems with nearby residents. Until then I think it is risky to do anything that would attract any extra use of the area, unless of course it can be supervised in some way? Anyway, I've rambled on a bit too much so – Wishing all at the newsletter a stress free summer – you are doing an excellent and vital job of keeping the village spirit alive. Reclusive types like myself really appreciate the information. It's good to know 'what's going on' even though we're perhaps not quite so involved as others. All the best

ROUND RYE BAY FOR MORE

August has seen fine weather and only very average fishing with the boats able to get a weeks work only by putting time in. Catches of mixed species have been poor and only the Dover Soles and small amount of other prime fish making the trip up. The netter's have also been able to get a fair number of trips in with some good catches but the Spider Crabs showing in abundance making very hard work of clearing and cleaning nets and ruining a lot of gear.

Local demand for wet fish is very poor with the bulk of the catches going to France again. The hot weather of course is playing its part with people not cooking fishing and once again different so much but perhaps our eating habits are opportunities. changing faster than we think.

Most of the fishing is still being carried out on the night time tides and the amount of boats and yachts on passage up and down the Channel means good watch keeping, is essential.

Things seem to work pretty well most of the time but with the seabed scattered with known debris and wrecks, trawlers sometimes have to pull one way and then change course again in a short space of time to avoid things which are not obvious on the surface making it difficult for the boat on passage to work out the trawlers intentions.

The nights are drawing in fast so autumn on its way bringing another change to the

SECURITY RECOMMENDATIONS

The pattern of night time crime has continued right across the whole Battle and Rye area with thefts from sheds, garages and outbuildings, vehicles broken into, and stolen plants, hanging baskets and similar. This is by no means just a local problem, being mirrored almost everywhere! Just recently, particularly in the Rye area, there have been a number of situations where residents disturbed by noises have 'frightened off' potential offenders by turning lights on and making it obvious that they were watching. I am quite sure that such simple actions have prevented several offences, so well done to those involved and thanks from the officers on the ground!

The knowledge that these offences are occurring should in theory allow us to be better prepared to prevent them. Obviously the offenders have a huge advantage over Police as they can strike anytime, anywhere, while Police resources are understandably limited.

Perhaps locking everything up or fixing it down shouldn't be necessary, but we have to be realistic, and unfortunately IT IS! There are still too many incidents where sheds, outbuildings and even cars are left insecure, making life so easy for the thieves!

PLEASE STAY ALERT TO NIGHT TIME NOISES, LOOK OUT, TURN LIGHTS ON AND REPORT IT AT THE TIME!

PLEASE CHECK AND RECHECK YOUR SECURITY, UPGRADE IT WHERE POSSIBLE, AND DON'T FORGET THAT SECURITY IS IMPORTANT DURING THE DAYTIME TOO!

CAR CRIME - A REMINDER

It seems to be that this time of year car crime is very high, and there have been reports of many incidents. These include several whilst the drivers have been at the beach, and one that occurred at 4.30am when the driver had left his car unlocked and unattended for a few minutes, believing that there was no-one around at that time but came back to find his wallet and phone stolen. Whenever you are leaving your car unattended, even for a short time, remember the following simple points:

ALWAYS lock it and close all windows, even if only leaving it for a moment or two. NEVER leave bags, coats or jackets in your car. The opportunist thief does not know whether they contain anything valuable until he has broken a window to find out.

If you can't take items with you, lock them in the boot, but don't do it where you are leaving the vehicle in case anyone is watching.

Don't leave valuable items such as cameras or mobile phones in your car - 40% of car crime involves mobiles being stolen. Remove your car stereo if you can.

Don't leave vehicle documents or any other personal documentation in your car.

TRAVELLERS

There are currently a number of unauthorized sites around the County where the local authorities and or landowners are taking legal action to remove travelers from land. These groups will of course have to find other locations to set up home and this message is to alert you to the possibility of large groups of travelers seeking such sites. Such groups often consist of thirty or more caravans, together with their associated towing vehicles! They are actively looking for an alternative site as the authorities take steps to move them on and landowners, farmers etc. should take steps to secure any vulnerable land. Please be aware that this is an ongoing situation where they will move from area to area seeking potential locations, and please report any activity that might lead to another site.



Rye Harbour Lifeboat Report



This month things have been just a little bit busier with 12 calls, yes the round dozen.

The first call came on the 27 July, an inflatable blowing to sea off Camber. One Adult and One Child put ashore at Camber. The next day the 28th July we had four shouts starting at 2.30 in the afternoon and finishing at ten past seven. The first call was to three swimmers thought to be in trouble off Camber, the Lifeboat escorted them ashore. We were then asked to assist with the search for a missing 7yr old boy at Camber, he was found safe ashore by others. Shortly after for a missing 7yr old Girl at Camber after the Lifeboat returned to Station we were asked to assist Pett Rescue with a towing job to a Cabin Cruiser who's engine had over heated. The Cabin Cruiser was towed to it's berth in Rock Channel and the Lifeboat returned to station. A short while after we were asked to go to camber to assist in the search for another missing child, this one was also found by others safe on shore. and boat were down the shore in under ten minutes only to be stood down, as all was now OK. On the 12th August we went to another inflatable off Camber. this one made it's own way ashore. 15th August an inflatable blowing to sea off Camber when the Lifeboat arrived the crew found three youths from County Waterford, Republic of Ireland, needing assistance, they were holidaying at Camber.

On the 16th two inflatables blowing to sea were landed at Camber. On the 17th we were asked to assist with the search 2 hrs the girl was found safe ashore by others. On the way back to station the Lifeboat picked up an inflatable with two adults and one child and returned them to shore. On the 21st August we were called to two inflatables off Camber but it turned out that these had just blown away in the wind. At times we think it's a shame that they don't all blow away in

We offer the service to people whatever their age, race, gender, personal beliefs, sexual orientation or social background. All they need is to want to improve their current adult relationships, or make the next one work better than the last.

AGE CONCERN 2nd BLOOD PRESSURE ASSOCIATION BLOOD PRESSURE TESTING WEEK 16 - 22 SEPTEMBER 02

Free Blood Pressure Testing to support National Awareness Campaign Anyone concerned about their Blood Pressure can attend a FREE testing session 11.00 am and 12.00 pm on:-

Tuesday and Wednesday 17th & 18th September Rye Baptist Church Hall High blood pressure is the major cause of strokes and heart failure and one of the three major factors in causing heart attacks. More than one third of the adult population in the UK have high blood pressure (a level greater than 140/90mmHg) but less than half are diagnosed.

The Blood Pressure Association is encouraging everyone to find out what their blood pressure levels are during its weeklong campaign.

Hundreds of volunteers across the UK, supported by the BPA, will be running Pressure Stations during the testing week. Last year over 20,000 people had their blood pressure checked during the first ever national blood pressure testing event. Often the first time people find out they have blood pressure is when they discover they have a heart condition or have a stroke. We urge people to take this opportunity to find out what their blood pressure is and what it should be. It won't take long and it could save your life. Andrea Talbot (Co-ordinator)

The autumn migration is now well underway, some birds stopping off on their long journey down to Africa, others undertaking more local movements. Many wildfowl have been moving in during the past couple of weeks, many on feeding flocks close inshore frequently their way to wintering grounds in Europe. The islands and shallow water out from Castle Water hide are now teeming with birdlife, especially gulls and Lapwings, but also several Garganey. These duck look very similar to Teal at this time of year, as the drakes take on a brown plumage similar to the females. only about 50 pairs nesting in Britain in a

Garganey however are much rarer, with typical year, although numbers increase during the autumn migration. Teal are also moving in - over 90 are now present, young willows at Castle Water to help and flocks of Canada Geese are becoming maintain the reed bed habitat - also a very conspicuous, feeding amongst the stubble fields along with flocks of Mallards, and heading to Ternery Pool to roost at dusk. The Little Egret roost at Castle Water has once again reached record numbers - 50 were seen leaving the roost on 27 August. Dawn watches here have also produced up to 330

Yellow Wagtails leaving their roost and four Hobbies. Other birds of prey seen recently include regular sightings of Peregrine and Marsh Harrier. Over 200 Sandwich Terns are still present, with attracting the attention of Arctic Skuas which engage in spectacular aerial chases to steal fish from the terns. A good variety of warblers and waders are also passing through now, so it is an excellent time to see a good variey of species around Rye Harbour.

Eventually Lord Beaverbrooks manager asked Ted to be the foreman of the biggest Friesian herd in the world and they won the Butterpat Trophy. Ted went on to manage Lord Hudson's farm. Finally he worked for the son of Sir John Anderson, the

inventor of the famous Anderson shelter. Ted retired with Hilda to Rye Harbour and bought the fishing boat the Elsie May. Hilda can be seen in the

photograph sunbathing on the boat. The other one shows Ted on the lifeboat at Newhaven which Ted's hard work helped purchase. Ted is a very popular member of our community and can be seen everyday with his dog Badger walking on the Nature Reserve and birdwatching. He is a keen vegetable gardener and is always friendly and ready to help anyone. He and Hilda were always very

ihospitable and I have had a number of meals of freshly cooked dabs and vegetables from the garden. Hilda became very frail for a number of years before she died and Ted took very good care of her in his typically good humoured, no fuss way.

The Rye and District University of the Third Age will have its inaugural meeting on Monday 2 September 2002, at 2.00 in the Rye Community Centre.

There are already plans for individual subject groups covering the Mediaeval History of the Marsh, Practical Art, Art Appreciation, Literature, Bird Watching, Things Italian and Current Affairs. Anyone with any other ideas for starting a group should come along to the meeting.

The inaugural meeting will launch the subject groups, elect officers and set the annual fee, which will probably be £10 or £12 per person, including a subscription to the national organization.

"Rye town is full of really excellent societies. The University of the Third Age does something different – it lets retired people combine together, to learn together, in a mutually supportive atmosphere," according to the steering group of local people, organizing the inaugural meeting.

Membership is open to anyone who is retired and living in Rye and District. The philosophy behind the University of the Third Age is one of small groups of retired people, meeting during the day, often in each other's homes, to learn co-operatively about subjects of their own choice. There is also a monthly general meeting, normally with a guest speaker.

We are trying to get the word out into the villages that the U3A will be holding its inaugural meeting at 2.00 pm on Monday, September 2nd 2002 in the Rye Community Centre. (There will be another meeting with a speaker same place, same time, Monday, October 7th)

Under the U3A umbrella, individual retired people form small groups, which, importantly, meet in the day, often in people's homes, to study or practice things, which interest them.

We already have had suggestions of groups to work on the history of the marsh (probably focused on mediaeval times), things Italian, art appreciation, practical art, current affairs, literature and bird watching, but it is wide open to anyone to suggest setting up a group to do more or less anything.
