





East Sussex Fire and Rescue Service recently attended an incident involving an unattended chip pan in the Pinders Road area of Hastings. The occupier had fallen asleep with the chip pan still on. Fortunately a neighbour was awoken by the smoke alarm and was able to phone ESFRS for assistance.

If you like deep-fried food follow a few simple rules:

- * Never fill the pan more than one third full.
- * Dry food before putting it in the oil.
- * Test the temperature with a small piece of bread.
- * If the oil starts to smoke don't put food in. Turn off the heat and leave to cool.
- * Don't ever leave the pan unattended.
- * If there are flames, never throw water over the pan. It will explode.
- * Turn off the heat if it's safe to do so, never lean over the pan.
- * If you have a fire blanket, put it over the pan.
- * Alternatively run a cloth under the tap, wring it out and cover pan.
- * Don't use a fire extinguisher on a pan filled with oil.
- * Leave the pan to cool completely.
- * Use a thermostat-controlled electric deep fat fryer.
- \ast If you can't deal with the fire, close the door on the way out and call 999.



ay has seen the weather settle down longest spell of light winds multi rig gear and are for a long time and therefore Rye bay has been but as yet the hauls have very busy with trawlers, netters and beam trawlers. All scalloping has now stopped with a couple of the bigger boats trying their luck with beam trawls. These are nets held open with the aid of a steel leaving nets overnight or beam with shoes or wheels that run on the seabed. Soles are again the target fish but they are used on the harder and rougher ground where it is not possible to fish the multi rig gear. Although the run of fish was good with bigger Dover Soles and a few Lemon Soles on the catch, they were only landing the same in value as boats fishing on the fair- one boat that is combining er ground and because of wear and tear on the

expensive gear, it was not viable.

Now most boats have switched to over to the fishing for Soles at night been down on last year apart from the odd lucky hit.

The netters have taken all cod fishing gear off and they also are targeting Dover Sole, either by quick shooting in the early hours and then fishing the gear at first light to avoid too much weed and rubbish catching hold on in the nets. The catches have been quite good so far, and without the dreaded spider crab giving too much trouble they have got off to a fair start with their summer fishing.

There are still a few Whelks being landed by this fishing with some trawling out on the rough ground of Dungeness. The Whelk pots are fished every day or every other day and the results are quite promising although the marketing seems to be a problem with the catch having to be sent to processors along with Whelk catches from other ports.

Trawling on the rough ground with a single net made for the job is always a bit hit and miss, for hardly a trip goes by without some sort of damage to the net or something, be it old anchors, parts of wreckage or one of the old cables that seem to lay everywhere, but the odd day when things go right, there is sometimes a nice bag of mixed fish.


